I thought Mary Anne DiGrazia earned more than Second Place, but the judges thought differently. Her well grown plant, Blc. Yuko Ito 'Volcano Queen' presented 2 spikes with six 5 inch blossoms, each yellow with a touch of


The Third Place ribbon was given to Bill Timm's Bulbophyllum medusae. It had 'a lot of blossoms'...too small and too many on 6 inflorescences. The many small white blossoms formed a nice display somewhat like a very

small starburst. This species is native to Borneo.

Don't forget the **Speaker's Choice Award**, Blc. Penny Helen 'Kudos' AM/AOS, a beautifully grown plant with 3 blossoms and 3 buds. The light purple blossoms with dark lips were 4 inches across. Oh yes, this beautiful orchid was brought to the meeting for your enjoyment by Cynthia Vance.

# **Preparing Your Plant for the Show**

With the Sarasota, Venice, and Englewood orchid shows taking place in the next six months (see dates on page 6), members might want to start thinking about some of the steps they need to take to insure that their plants score high in the competitions.

At least a month before the show, take a good look at your orchids and select those that you want to enter. If possible, segregate them from your other plants to avoid last minute disease or insect problems, maintaining their orientation to the light to prevent buds and flowers twisting towards the light. In general, plants with green or white flowers should be placed in a shadier position while pink and red flowers will benefit from a sunnier location.

Orchids that produce tall spikes will normally require the support of one or more stakes made from bamboo cane, strong galvanized wire, or other materials. Ties can be made with floral wire, raffia, soft green string or similar flexible plant tapes; avoid the use of twist ties. The materials should be as inconspicuous as possible to avoid distracting the judges from the plant and flowers. Staking is easiest and most effective if done from the early stages of spike development.

Cymbidium and dendrobium spikes need to be trained as soon as they appear by inserting a cane or wire behind the spike, being careful not to injure close lying roots. Once the spike has reached about a foot in length, a tie should be applied making a figure eight with the knot next to the cane. Once the buds begin to form, place a second tie just below the first bud. If you decide that the spike should arch, an extra cane may be needed. Otherwise, use additional ties as needed to keep the spike straight.

Odontoglossums and their inter-generic hybrids are trained in the same manner. Some arch naturally while others produce an upright spike and those that naturally branch will show their flowers better with the terminal spike erect. Again, use the thinnest wire or cane, snip off excess string from the knots, and trim the support even with the highest point of the spike or flower. Paphiopedilums only require staking up to the point where the spike and buds have formed. A thin cane should be placed behind the stem and tied once on the stem and once below the flower bud. After the bud has opened, a final tie may be made if necessary to lift the angle of the flower.

Phaleonopsis hybrids benefit more than other orchids from proper staking. Spikes should be trained upright once they reach eight inches and the last tie should be placed under the first bud. Phaleonopsis are normally allowed to arch from this point, but additional staking may be needed to support the spike as flowers open.

Cattleyas are normally trained to grow vertical pseudobulbs and consequently need less staking. A stake should be placed behind the flowering pseudobulb while the buds are still in the buds are still in the sheath and a single tie made at its base. A second tie is required where the bulb and the leaf join and ties on the flower stem should only be made after the flower has opened and set.

Carefully check the plants, pots, and growing medium for any signs of disease or pests and treat as needed. If pests and diseases are severe or widespread, it may be better to wait for a later show opportunity. It's a good idea to place a few pellets of slug and snail bait at the base of the spike to eliminate these pests.

Two or three days before the show, remove any dead bracts and sheath remnants as well as discolored and damaged leaves. Leaf tips that have been damaged should be trimmed using a sterilized blade in such a way as to present a natural shape. Any cuts should be treated with a suitable fungicide. The upper and lower surfaces of all leaves should be cleaned using a cotton swab and clean water or a mixture of milk and clean water. In case of water spots caused by hard water, a dilute solution of vinegar and water may be used. Algae, mineral deposits and grime should be cleaned from the pots and all protruding stakes should be trimmed. If allowed, pot covers or moss trimmed baskets may add to the desired effect.

Check the labeling to make sure it is clear and accurate. The genus name is followed by the hybrid name or seedling cross and varietal name then any award abbreviations. Also, make sure that the pot is clearly labeled with your name and contact information.

Water your plants as needed the day before the show. Your plants may be subjected to low humidity levels and high temperatures during transport and air conditioning during the show. Check to see if your plants need additional temporary staking during transport. Tissue paper can be placed between individual flowers to prevent them rubbing during transit.
