Dr. Hackney is Emeritus Professor of Biology and the former Director of Coastal Biology at the University of North Florida in Jacksonville, Florida. Previously he was Professor of Biology and Marine Biology at the University of North Carolina-Wilmington. Courtney began growing orchids in the Florida Keys in 1962, while working for a small orchid nursery and has

continued his interest in both orchid hybridizing and orchid culture since then. He grows many different genera, but his favorite is the Cattleya Alliance.

He has about 500 mature cattleyas and even more seedlings, but his favorites are classic clones, some of which appeared in orchid collections over 100

years ago. He makes 8-10 hybrids and species sib crosses per year in various genera.

He wrote a Growing Tips column for 20 years, which ended in December 2013. Growing Tips appeared in newsletters around the country. He has also published in the *Orchid Digest*. In 2004, he published "*American Cattleyas*", the culmination of a decade of study and interviews, which summarizes in old photographs and print how all of the modern cattleyas came to be. The book also describes what we know about cattleyas and cattleya hybrids, how to grow them, and what to expect from modern hybrids. During the past decade he has been researching the coerulea (blue) color form of cattleya species and hybrids. His article on how to predict success of coerulea Cattleya hybrids is nearing completion.

He and his wife Rose live in Jacksonville, Florida adjacent to a tidal swamp. Rose retired as a professional artist in 2017, but continues painting for fun. *Epi magnoliae (conopseum)* grows in trees of the swamp in his backyard. His orchids reside in a brand new 24'x25' Florida shade house adjacent to the swamp.

Common Orchid Growing Mistakes

"Do no harm" is a basic tenant of the medical profession that many orchid hobbyists would be wise to adopt. A large number of orchids I see in my travels suffered premature deaths or injury, largely because of a misinformed attempt to help the orchid grow. The following is a list assembled from my experience with other growers and from my own mistakes.

"My orchids get the best water money can buy." My first question of the novice holding a shriveled, dead orchid is about their water. One person even admitted that she had a water softener installed for her orchid because she knew her water was "hard". Hard or mineral laden water may not be ideal, but softened water introduces salts that are toxic to orchids and typically lethal within a few weeks.

Another common mistake is to over-fertilize based on the conclusion that a poorly growing orchid needs more fertilizer. If over-watering is the number one killer of orchid plants, over fertilizing is number two. Fertilizers are nutrient salts that plants require along with water and light to grow. Recently purchased orchid that have a good root system do not require much in the way of fertilizer. Often, these plants have been grown quickly in commercial nurseries by maximizing light, water, and fertilizer. In the home environment, light is typically limiting and the medium contains all the nutrients the orchid needs in the short term. More often, the orchid pot needs to be flushed thoroughly with water occasionally to remove nutrients and to keep roots healthy.

Some pesticide and fungicide warning labels seem to state the obvious, e.g. "do not drink this product". Who would do such a thing? After fielding questions about pests, pesticides and orchids, I realize that no warning is too simple. Read the warning label carefully for both your own safety and the health of your orchids. The most common orchid-related pest problem seems to be overdosing and under dosing with pesticides. If the label calls for one teaspoon per gallon, use exactly that amount. Just because a scale infestation was "really bad" does not mean the concentration should be higher unless the label tells you to use a higher dosage. Some of the hormonal pesticides do pre-scribe lower concentrations after an initial treatment.

Another sometimes fatal error orchid hobbyists make is to change growing media because they see well grown orchids in some new medium. This often happens to relatively new hobbyists after purchasing plants from a commercial nursery or a visiting speaker. The mistake is to immediately repot every orchid into this "new medium". In most cases, the results are disastrous. There is much to learn by examining the growing medium of a commercial grower or very successful amateur. But remember that their success is specific to a set of growing conditions that may be very different from yours. In some cases, plants growing poorly at commercial nurseries are discarded, leaving the impression that all orchids grow well in this new medium. Some groups of orchids grow well in one medium, but not in another.

Common Orchid Growing Mistakes continued...

There is nothing wrong with experimenting with a medium and evaluating how well your plants grow in that medium, but avoid a wholesale conversion to a new medium.

The most surprised individual is the novice grower that brings their plant in and asks what they should do to their orchid. Typically, their "problem" orchid has outgrown the pot, has roots going everywhere, and shows signs of having bloomed repeatedly. There is also usually an admission by the grower that they have neglected this "poor" orchid, but are determined to take better care of it next year. In other words, they have "done no harm" and the orchid has thrived.

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April 2018 Meeting Plant Table Awards



First Place and Blue Ribbon was captured by Sharon Miles for her striking Cattleya (C.) Lawrenceana x Laeliocattleya (Lc.) Trick or Treat. Her plant had more than 15 blooms around the edge of a wooden basket, so a close-up photo of a few captures their high beauty. Sharon grows it in Orchiata bark, rocks and some cocoanut husk. Hybrids with Lc. Trick or Treat provide so much satisfaction for all of us – producing many orange blooms all at once in a compact space. Beautiful specimen Sharon!

Second Place and Red Ribbon was awarded to Kate Burda for her standout Cattleya (C.) Motte Spot 'Paradise' AM/AOS with its waxy spotted sepals and lovely deep fuschia lip. AM stands for Award of Merit, awarded to an orchid plant scoring 80-89 points on a 100-point scale. Instead of traditional repotting Kate 'potted up' by placing the pot inside a larger ceramic pot, also with openings for drainage. This method is a life-saver for those of us behind in our greenhouse tasks. Great job Kate!





Third Place and Yellow Ribbon was granted to Bill Rich for his Yamadara Redland Sunset (Encyclia cordigera alba x Blc. Orange Nuggett). Bill's plant had 6 blooms with dreamy mango-orange petals and sepals and a deep pink lip. Orchid devotees love this beautiful compact plant which emanates a lovely aroma. Check out Lowes -- sometimes these beauties are found in the 'bag babies' section. Nice growing Bill!

Best Species and Purple Ribbon was presented to Carol Wood for Leptotes (Lpt.) pohlitinocoi with its darling 1.8-inch pink flowers. Carol grows it in the spagham-filled cup on one of Joanna's lovely clay mounts. This species is endemic to Brazil in the Bahia montane rainforests at elevations of 1500-2500 feet. Though we live almost at sea level, this warm growing epiphyte is one of our first orchid species to bloom in the early spring. Charming specimen and presentation Carol!

New Member Grower and Pink Ribbon was given to Ken and Stephanie Luberger for their Renanthera (Ren.) monachica -- a species from Asia with its dainty orange speckled flowers. The genus *Renanthera* was described in 1790 by missionary/botanist Joao Loureiro. Its name combines the Latin "renis" meaning kidney, and the Greek "anthera" or anther, referring to the kidney shape of the pollen grains. Thank you, Ken and Stephanie for growing this special beauty!

Members' Choice and Green Ribbon was awarded to Steve Vogelhaupt for his Sophrolaeliocattleya (Slc.) Circle Spirit 'SVO' x Cattleya (C.) Jose Diaz Castro 'Magnifica' – with 7 luscious 4-inch dark pink blooms with velvet purple lips. Steve says his plant has bloomed 4 times in the last 14 months -- surely an impetus for our insatiable members-growers. Also, it surely has lived up to Sun Coast Valley Orchids' (SVO) forecast, "There should be award winners here!" Magnificent growing Steve!





Speaker's Choice and White Ribbon was awarded to Jo Davis for her Dendrobium (Den.) capituliflorum 'Jo' CCE/AOS, an unusual species. Jo entered this plant -- having at that time 80 'pompoms' with 20 flowers each -- in the 2017 Englewood Orchid Show and received the Certificate of Cultural Excellence from accumulating 93 points out of 100 points scale. Hence, she's allowed to name her plant and she chose 'Jo' for its clonal name. Tonight, it had 90+ 'pompoms' totaling 1800+ flowers! Thanks for growing and bringing in such a unique orchid Jo!

VAOS Spring Orchid Garden Tour

Saturday May 5th

9am – 1pm

VAOS members (especially our new members!) are invited to join us on Saturday, May 5th, to tour three experienced growers orchid growing areas in south Venice and on Venice Island. Each growing area is unique and will provide the opportunity to share culture tips and see how others grow their orchids.

Stop 1 - Judy Loeffler - Venice Island

Judy grows her orchids in a greenhouse and in a custom-designed shade house in her back yard. Her 300+ collection includes a wide variety of orchids including cattleyas, dendrobiums, phalaenopsis, vandas and some specialty plants.

Directions: From Rt. 41 bypass, take the Circus (south) Bridge to the island. Turn right on Pine Grove and then right on Guild Dr. #833 is on your left near the end of the street. Park in the driveway, on the street and on the grass in front of their house. Walk around the right side of the house to the growing area.

Stop 2 – Naoki Kawamura - Venetia

Naoki recently relocated from Portland OR to Venice. He grows about 200 vandaceous orchids and some brassovola and cattleya orchids in his pool cage.

Directions: Rt. 41, turn south on Jacaranda Blvd. Enter through the Jacaranda visitors gate and dial the code for Kawamura, Naoki for access. Proceed straight on Corso Venetia Blvd. Turn right on Natale Dr. and then right on Via Del Villetti to the 11th house on the right. Park on street – do not block driveways or mailboxes. Enter through front door – please do not ring doorbell.

Stop 3 – Carol Wood - Venetia

Carol grows 300+ orchids in her pool cage and in trees. Her collection is primarily cattleya alliance plants but also includes phalaenopsis, dendrobiums, and a few other varieties.

Directions: Rt. 41, turn south on Jacaranda Blvd. Enter through the Jacaranda visitors gate and dial the code for Wood, Douglas for access. If you plan to come, you must sign up. Based on the number of people we have we may divide the group into different starting points. Parking is limited at each location.
