## **Cultural Note: Watering for Success!**

The torrential rain we got last weekend led me to worry a bit about my plants, until my wife commented "What? Are we living in a rain forest?", and I realized that it's just the sort of rainfall they'd see routinely in the wild. That, of course, got me thinking about how the way our plants are watered can effect their growth.

First, let's consider exactly what a heavy rainfall in a tropical rain forest does to an orchid. Falling clearly in the Jeopardy category of "Stupid Answers", it provides water. Maybe just as obviously, it provides the majority of the nutrition to the plant, consisting of host-tree exudates and any other airborne deposits that may have accumulated on the foliage. If we delve more into the physics and chemistry aspects though, we'll see that it does much more than that!

All of that water, pouring through the plant's roots and the accumulated detritus, flushes it very thoroughly, both chemically, ridding it of plant wastes and unwanted deposits, as well as mechanically, pushing the finer contaminants, molds and their spores, and decomposition products out of the root zone, aiding in keeping it airy. That rain also oxygenates the rhizosphere, not only from the oxygen dissolved in the rain droplets themselves, but by drawing air into the root mass as it pours through. Happening on a daily basis - often more than once a day - all of that "rain activity" keeps the root zone clean, moist and airy - prefect for the plant.

So how does that compare to the common ways we water our plants?

If we hand water with a hose using a water breaker held well above the plants, thoroughly flooding the plants each time we water, we come closest to simulating the rainfall their relatives experience in nature. Add a tiny amount of fertilizer to that "rain" and you just can't do any better. Being more gentle, filling the pot and letting it drain, comes in second in this regard, as it still has some of the benefits, but only on a limited basis. Dunking a plant in a tub is probably the worst way to water plants, as while it may provide water, it does very little oxygenation, dilutes-, but does not remove fertilizer salts and plant wastes, and does nothing to mechanically flush decomposed potting medium or dead roots from the container, ultimately leading to root suffocation and death. Lastly, you absolutely should not dunk multiple plants in the same tub of liquid, together or sequentially, as that is one of the best ways to share pathogens!

#### **VAOS Growers Clinic**

About 30 members joined us for the June 14<sup>th</sup> Growers Clinic where Jim Thomas presented Orchid Basics Part 2 – pots, media, repotting and tools. Jim also demonstrated plant division in preparation for our next Growers Clinic – Hands on repotting – on July 12<sup>th</sup>.



Hands-on Orchid Repotting Clinic
Thursday, July 12th, 2018

Jim Thomas and the Growers Clinic team will present a Hands-on Orchid Repotting clinic at the Venice Community Center at 7:00 p.m. They will explain the supplies, tools and planting media, demonstrate basic procedures and share their tips of the trade. Participants will then repot their own orchid with the assistance of several experienced growers and helpers. We will work in teams of 4 or 5 around a table with each person bringing an orchid that needs repotting as well as a suitable pot to replant the orchid and a sterile pair of shears. With only two hours available and a large turnout expected, it's critical that everyone adhere to the instructions below:

- Only one plant per person
- Bring your pot and shears
- All plants must be removed from their pot and all old planting media and dead roots must be removed and cleaned prior to the clinic
- Please make sure your plant is free from pests or diseases.

Media and supplies for Phalaenopsis, Cattleya alliance, and Dendrobiums will be provided.

Bring your problem plants for expert help. Guests are welcome. We look forward to seeing you there!

#### **Venice Orchid Project and City Hall Atrium Project Updates**

While attending a meeting at the **Venice City Hall**, I noticed the atrium in the lobby had been refurbished and looked very nice. The Venice Garden Club had planted these areas but there was a large trellis against the north wall that was unused and might be a good spot to hang orchids on a temporary basis while they were in peak bloom. After contacting Alice Highman, the special projects chair for the Garden Club, we thought orchids would be a good fit and she OK'd the used of the trellis. She later suggested some other spots along the glass walls and she also gathered support for the project from fellow Garden Club members.

The first orchids came from Orchid Envy as well as myself, Donn Smart and Natasha Romero. Rick Belisle joined the team and has brought in some of his own plants. So far we have kept a nice display going in spite of the rising temperatures and increased direct sunlight. I check them Monday, Rick checks them Fridays. The plants on the trellis were getting too much sun so we decided not to use it for the rest of the summer. Since the remaining plants are on the ground, they remain in the shade and do very well for several weeks.

Plants with the best displays so far are tall Oncidiums, Phalenopsis, and tall Dendrobiums. One Epidendrum is out in the sun and is still blooming after 6 weeks and a little tolumnia has never quit yet! We'll keep trying to have a nice, but somewhat smaller display through the Summer and probably get more Cattleyas and Encyclias, etc. to hang on the trellis when the sun sinks lower in the sky in October. Judy Loffler had two nice signs made that say "Orchids provided by VAOS". So far reaction has been very positive by city personnel as well as visitors to the building and the Garden Club is "delighted" with the display.



#### **Venice Orchid Project (VOP)**

In 2014 the VAOS began a project to plant and mount orchids in city parks and trees. To date, more than 200 orchids have been established in Blalock Park, Centennial Park and the City Hall Park. Plants are donated by VAOS members and local orchid nurseries.



I currently have about 25 nice nodosa, dendrobium and encyclia plants ready to hang in trees. We'll probably aim for Blalock Park for most, but a few in Heritage Park might be nice. Centennial park would be a great spot to display, but hot and dry so we have had little success there.





The terrestrial garden at Blalock Park needs help. What is there is doing OK, but we need more color. I would like to find some Spathiglottis, Phaius, and epidendrums so we can get more blooms in that space. If you have some of these species to donate to the project, please contact me. I will pick them up!

He gave a great presentation entitled 'Decoding Dedrobiums", a very diverse species with 1200 species in 40 sections. He had a great selection of plants for sale.

Joanna Shaw and Jeff Higel presented the plant table. John and Sharon Kahnoski did the raffle table.

#### **June 2018 Meeting Plant Table Awards**



First Place and Blue Ribbon was captured by Carol Wood for her beautiful fuschia Cattleya (C.) gaudii var coerulea C. loddigesii var coerulea 'Blue Sky' x C. leopoldii var coerulea 'Kathleen'. Her plant had more than 13 blooms climbing out of a small 4-inch plastic

pot, set in a 6-inch clay pot which was 'potted up' again into an 8-inch plastic basket! That's makes 'repotting' easy and Carol's

plant seems to enjoying having so many roots escaping into our humid Florida air! (See this plant's 'potting up' photo!) Beautiful specimen, Carol!





Second Place and Red Ribbon was awarded to Steve Vogelhaupt for his majestic 3- foot tall Encyclia (E.) Paula Gross. The plant, registered by R.H. Gross in January 1976, is a favorite among hobbyists. Each of the 4 inflorescences had more than 40 flowers making it a spectacular display. Steve enhanced his plant's presentation by the careful staking of each inflorescence with my favorite stakes -- the unobtrusive thin green 30-inch wires available at Broward Orchid Supply and easily cut for shorter plants. Great growing, Steve!

Third Place and Yellow Ribbon was granted to Natasha Romero for her darling pink Phalaenopsis (Phal.) Tying Shin Angel. It was a lovely presentation of this mini-phal with both sides staked beautifully for a delightful display. This hybrid was registered in April 2004 by Kuo-Liang Hung who was noted as a 'new talent in phalaenopsis hybridizing' having received the most awards among Taiwanese growers acc. to the AOS May 2010 magazine article. Keep an eye out for



hearty 'Tying Shin' beauties and thank you Natasha for bringing it in!

Best Species plus Speakers Choice Ribbons were presented to Jeff Higel for his Encyclia (E.) tampensis semi alba 'Siesta Key'. Although we had several E. tampensis plants that night, Jeff's plant stood out for its bright green blooms, different from the typical rust-tinted Tampensis which can be found in oak trees in our nearby nature reserves. As someone said, "Encyclias grow like crazy in Florida" and Jeff has many available at Honey Bee Nursery, Englewood. Congratulations Jeff!

Both New Member Grower and Member's Choice ribbons were awarded to Carol Havaz for her precious species, Rhynchostylis (Rhy.) Retusa. The two flowing pink and white racemes made for an entrancing balanced presentation. Related to the Vanda alliance, most rhynchostylis hail from the Far East and though lacking in pseudobulbs, they have drought-resistant leathery leaves. They're easy to grow in baskets in our warm, humid climate with a gentle air movement and their fragrant blooms will bring much pleasure during our cooler winter months. Beautiful growing, Carol!
