# Speaker: Courtney Hackney Topic: Unappreciated Cattleya Species in Modern Hybrids

Our October meeting will feature Courtney Hackney, Ph.D. from Jacksonville, Florida. Courtney is going to talk about different cattleya species, including some of the unappreciated ones, that are in the background of modern hybrids. He will give us insights into how the characteristics of different cattleyas are expressed in their offspring. Should be a great help to us when we look at the plant tags of seedlings we'd like to bring home, letting us conjure up an image of how the blooms might look!

Dr. Hackney is Emeritus Professor of Biology at North Florida University, and is a prolific author. Recently, he has been researching coerulea Cattleyas, culminating in an excellent article in the November 2018 issue of ORCHIDS. Other useful columns on breeding and culture can be found on his website.

Courtney grows a variety of hybrids and species in Jacksonville, Florida, but his favorites are the great Cattleya hybrids. He has about 500 mature Cattleyas in his shade house, including some classic clones which appeared in collections over 100 years ago.

He makes 10 to 15 hybrids as well as sibling species crosses per year. He will have plants for sale at our meeting.

#### When is the Best Time to Repot My Orchid?



Orchids are best repotted when they are in active growth. Orchids are usually in active growth shortly after blooming when they send out new shoots and/or leaves and new roots begin to form. Be careful not to break the tips of the growing roots or the new growth of the plant.

Phalaenopsis are very forgiving and can be repotted just about any time they are not in bloom. On the other extreme, Dendrobiums prefer to be repotted only as new growth appears.

There will always be instances when an orchid must be repotted immediately (for example if the pot breaks, or the media is severely decomposed) in which case be as gentle as you can.

# lan's Corner

There's plenty of water in the universe without life, but nowhere is there life without water." Sylvia Earle, Marine Biologist

Hello. My name is Ian Kennedy, and I am a waterer.

Orchids present lots of challenges for all of us and perhaps more for waterers like me. Imagine leaving a plant alone for 3 or 4 days in a row, maybe more....and not watering it. That's a huge challenge for a waterer.

I read that I should let many of my plants almost dry out or completely dry out before watering them again. *How am I supposed to know when they reach that "dry enough" stage?* Use your finger to see if the medium is wet. Really? My fingers can't get very far into bark, moss, and rocks. I have a hard time getting a thin bamboo support into that stuff. My finger? *You'll know it's time when the pot feels light*. Really? How light is light? *If you're not sure, wait another day.* Really? For someone from operations and accounting who always reads the directions, always has Google Maps or Waze on when he's driving home and always follows recipes, these dryness measuring suggestions just don't seem precise enough. In my just over 3 years of this new hobby, I've rotted lots of Phal. and Cat. roots with too much water. So here are some things I have been trying and with some success so far.

Commercial nurseries use moss as their growing medium for young plants. It is generally free of weeds and pathogens and its high porosity permits easy penetration for the fine roots. It's also inexpensive. But it holds a large amount of water and for us hobbyists, especially beginners, we don't realize how much water moss can retain, especially in solid, plastic or ceramic containers. We think waiting 2, 3, 4 days is enough but even then, the moss inside, around the roots may be soaking wet. We aren't good at judging dryness and the result often is too wet for too long. I now get my new plants out of their moss filled containers as soon as they have acclimated to their new surroundings and into my containers with my own blends of bark, sponge rock, lava rock, clay pellets and charcoal. None of these retains much water. (I now use moss only when I need a little extra moisture retention for some plants or a little cushioning for some of my mountings.)

Instead of solid plastic, I use net pots, ensuring faster evaporation and clear plastic, slotted pots so I can see what my moisture conditions are. I use ceramic containers and clay pots but only if they have lots of holes. Here are some reliable sources for me for pots and media: Kelley's Korner (korchid.com), Repotme.com, Joanna's Orchid Pottery, Orchid Envy (Venice).

My mentor, Donn Smart, now mounts most of his orchids bare rooted on pieces of cypress, oak, fernwood, and cork bark, something I am doing more of. Bare root mounting is perfect for waterers like me because I can literally water every day and not worry. It is almost impossible to over water.

So waterers, there is hope.

# HOW MUCH SHOULD I FEED MY ORCHIDS?

In the plant world, orchids are slow growers, so are quite undemanding of fertilizer. Despite that fact, one question I hear a lot is "How much do I feed my orchids?".

There are a lot of things that go into an answer, such as fertilizer formula, the frequency of feeding, and the concentration of the solution. Let's start by taking a glance at the science of plant growth.

The "building blocks" that make up about 90% of a plant are carbon (C), oxygen (O), hydrogen (H), and nitrogen (N). The first three come from water and air. For cultivated plants, the nitrogen comes from the fertilizer solutions we apply.

If we do the calculations for the chemical processes that result in "growth", we find that for a plant to add a pound of living tissue, it must take up and process about 200 pounds (~91 kg) of water and only about 5 grams of nitrogen from fertilizer. So what does that mean in more practical terms?


Let's say we expect a plant to add a pound of weight in a 10-year period – probably not a bad guess for a paphiopedilum that adds a new growth every nine to twelve months. That would mean the plant – on average – must absorb about 5 g  $\div$  520 weeks = 0.0096 g (9.6 mg) of nitrogen and about 0.175 kg of water per week. If 100% of what we deliver is absorbed, that suggests the "ideal solution" for weekly feeding would be 9.6 mg  $\div$  0.175 kg = 55mg/kg = 55 ppm N.

But wait! That does not mean that we should water with a 55 ppm N solution!

If the plant truly absorbed everything we apply to the pot and lost none of it through evaporation, that would be appropriate, but we really don't know 1) how much of that applied solution is retained by the potting medium, or 2) how much of it is absorbed by the plant!

Potting media retention varies all over the map, from "sponges" like sphagnum and rock wool, to "ducks' backs" like coarse Orchiata bark. Plus, as "retention" is the net of absorption and evaporation, there is even more variability, depending upon the local environment.

## How Much Should I Feed My Orchids? Continued



All in all, it is an extremely complex combination of events, so short of just giving up, what can we do? I think that the answer is to adjust your potting media and culture so that there is always a plentiful supply of water containing a tiny amount of fertilizer for the plant.

Using my preferred 25 ppm N solution as an example, that means that each gallon applied contains about 95 mg of nitrogen. If we pour a quart of that solution into a pot an average of twice a week, over our theoretical 10-year growth period, we will have delivered about 25 grams of nitrogen and 980 kg of water to the pot! That suggests that if the plant is able to take up roughly 20% of that, it's right on target.

That might be a reasonable uptake efficiency in culture that maintains constant moisture at the root system, but it is probably a gross overestimate for most growers. For all of us, I think the best bet is to use a very open mix and irrigate with such a dilute solution more often – sort of like what happens in nature. I know from my own experimentation with plants in semi-hydropic culture, that plants watered daily gained about 25% more weight than those watered every two- or three days.


