

January General Meeting Wednesday January 5th at 6:45pm

Speaker: Courtney Hackney

Topic: Unappreciated Cattleya Species in Modern Hybrids

Our January meeting will feature Courtney Hackney, Ph.D. from Jacksonville, Florida.



Dr. Hackney is Emeritus Professor of Biology at North Florida University, and is a prolific author. He has researched coerulea Cattleyas, culminating in an excellent article in the November 2018 issue of ORCHIDS. Other useful columns on breeding and culture can be found on his website.

Courtney grows a variety of hybrids and species in Jacksonville, Florida, but his favorites are the great Cattleya hybrids. He has about 500 mature Cattleyas in his shade house, including some classic clones which appeared in collections over 100 years ago. He makes 10 to 15 hybrids as well as sibling species crosses per year and periodically offers them for sale.

Venice Community Center, Room F. Enter left side of building. 7pm. Bring your problem plants for expert help. Guests are always welcome.



- The Englewood Plant Sale is November 6th from 9-12 pm at the Christ Lutheran Church in Englewood.


Carol Wood and Judy Loeffler, Co-Chairs of the Annual Orchid Show in February were welcomed to speak to members about the upcoming Show.

There was no Show in 2021 due to the pandemic. Our 2022 Show will be the 1st weekend in February and will be our 55th Annual Show. This Show is our primary fundraiser for our Society. Funds raised go toward paying our rent for our meetings, to pay speaker fees, subsidize social events as well as to support the AOS.

It takes an Army to put on a successful Show and we have 150 volunteer spots to fill. Volunteers receive a t-shirt, free admission to the Show, great food, and an opportunity to learn more about orchids. All committee chairs have been selected.

Show Changes this year include efforts to reduce congestion and open traffic flow during the Show. We will have 3 Society Displays. We are not asking Vendors to set up individual displays. Instead Venders will pool their plants to set up one vender display.

LET THERE BE LIGHT

In a previous Corner I wrote about my tendency to over water and how I deal with it. My other hurdle in this new hobby of mine is light. I read the descriptions of plants before I buy them and see many references to the light needed: "bright light", "some sun", "morning sun", "never mid-day sun" and other descriptions. Again, I'm a retired accounting/operations person. I like specifics and the orchid recipes are short on specifics, i.e., 3 tablespoons of sun or a ½ cup of bright light. What is bright light exactly? I read care instructions on the AOS website and see references to "foot candles" and "lumens" and the numbers preferred by each orchid type. I buy a light meter so I can measure foot candles and lumens. The light meter is in one of our junk drawers. The other part of this light challenge is that I don't know where geographically the author of the orchid's needs either lives or is referring to. Bright light in Wisconsin is not the same as bright light in Florida. Which bright light is it? Does it matter?

Five years ago, we bought what we felt was the best lot available in the new community in which we decided to retire. Our only requirement was that it had to be on water. I didn't own an orchid, didn't even think about orchids, so orientation to the sun wasn't a consideration. I have no control over the direction the sun travels relative to the position of the pool cage in which I house my orchids. It is what it is. As I've written before, I have no space in which I can put up a shade house or greenhouse and don't have any mature trees in which to hang plants. I do have a Sabal palm that now hosts a few air plants, a Vanda and two Phals, but that's it. Everything else is in the pool cage. I have a pole along one end of the cage from which hang my other Vandas and a few Cattleyas. I have two shelves on one wall and three shelves on another. The only area that gets any sun is the area in which the pole is located. Those plants get enough light because the blooming of the Cats. and Vandas is consistent. The other two growing areas get good light although on the low side. The plants seem healthy enough, but the blooming is not consistent and usually only one bloom, rarely multiple blooms.

For readers who have been with me since I started this series, you notice a theme. Few if any of us grow our orchids in ideal conditions and yet the conditions we have are often good enough to reward us with a few flowers. That is what is so neat to me. I get great pleasure watching my plants grow, send out new roots, adapt to their homes on my shelves and reward me with flowers. What remarkable plants that they can bring us so much joy even if they would prefer a few more lumens.



VAOS Mentor Program

Are you fairly new to growing orchids? After the last 18 months of no "in person" VAOS meetings do you have some questions or are you looking for some guidance that you feel pertains only to your particular growing situation? Are you an experienced grower looking for a rewarding opportunity to share your knowledge and skills and help new members? With over 400 members in the VAOS, it's probably a good idea to review the details of our Mentor Program and how you might benefit from it!

Our Mentor Program, one of only a handful of such programs in Florida, began in 2012 with an idea brought forth by Peg Fahrenback. The concept is quite simple. Match knowledgeable, experienced growers (the "mentors") with newer members (the "mentees") who might need a little personalized "jump start", over and above what might be gained by attending our meetings and Growers Clinics.

The mentor often supports their mentee by visiting the mentee's home, in a more social setting, for an hour or so, to gauge growing conditions, placement, specific plant requirements for light, watering and feeding, potting, pests, etc., and to discuss one of our favorite topics, orchids! Mentees, on the other hand, should be active VAOS members, are required to have attended at least two Growers Clinics, and of course have a genuine interest in improving the results of their orchid-growing endeavors. Graduates of the program gain the additional knowledge and skills they need to improve their results and receive an attractive VAOS Pin to commemorate and celebrate their achievement. We currently have 11 Mentors (HINT: We need more!) and have "graduated" almost 100 "mentees". Many have gone on to produce award-winning plants and to become mentors themselves!

If you would like to volunteer to join our team of mentors, which is a fun and rewarding way to share your orchid-growing skills, meet new orchid aficionados, and requires only a minimal amount of time or, if, in turn, you are struggling with your orchid collection and feel a mentor would help you with your "learning curve", complete the appropriate section of the Mentor/Mentee application, located HERE, or send an email to mentor@vaos.org.





November 3, 2021 Plant Table Awards





CATTLEYA (C.) WALKERIANA

First Place Blue Ribbon was awarded to Joanna Shaw for her large and magnificent Cattleya (C.) Walkeriana. It was beautifully hanging on a strong stand. Who found C walkeriana? George Gardner, an English botanist and orchid collector in 1893 during a trip to Brazil who afterwards named it after a fellow collector friend, George Walker. The word 'walkeriana' is not capitalized so we know it is a species! The plant is referred to as Queen of the Brazilian Savanna – found growing on rocky limestone or giant old or small trees along streams at elevations up to 6500+ feet – yet it thrives in Venice even though some species are difficult to grow here. It differs from most Catt species by having inflorescences which arise from the rhizome instead of from the apex of the pseudobulb. We love its vanilla to cinnamon scented flowers with such a striking lip and every year we see how much larger Joanna's plant has become! Exquisite cultivation, Joanna!

Beallara (Bllra.) Marfitch 'Howards Dream' AM/AOS

Second Place Red Ribbon was presented to **Janet Keown** for her beautiful and multiflorous Beallara (Bllra.) Marfitch 'Howards Dream' AM/AOS, a hybrid of Bratonia Charles M. Fitch x Oncidium Fremar. (New name is Aliceara (Alcra.) For those members who are new, AM/AOS means 'Award of Merit' from the American Orchid Society. (**See note re: judging below at the end of article) Now Janet's plant is mericlone (an exact copy) of one of the best intergeneric Oncidium hybrids! The large, deep grape/purple-colored flowers decorate its tall flower spikes which make for an exceptionally showy plant. It's a 'must-have' for a new grower for with basic care, yours too, can soon become such a specimen as Janet's. Thanks for bringing your plant in, Janet, and -- Great growing!

Catasetum (Ctsm.) Red Dragon

Third Place Yellow Ribbon was awarded to Vicki Fisher for her gorgeous dark red Catasetum (Ctsm.) Red Dragon. As Vicki wrote, "Catasetums were some of the first orchids I started growing back in 2017. I grow Catasetums because of their weird, wild and unusual looking flowers. One day I was perusing Ebay looking for different types of orchids to buy and I kept seeing Catts, Dens and the other mainstream orchids, and then the Red Dragon popped up. I bought it and the rest is history! I currently have over 100 catasetinae in all and my collection keeps growing at every chance I get." Beautiful job, Vicki!

Marmodes (Mo.) Painted Desert 'Rogue Red' x Ctsm. Dragon's Teeth

Speaker's Choice White Ribbon goes to again to **Vicki Fisher** for her eye-catching Marmodes (Mo.) Painted Desert 'Rogue Red' x Ctsm. Dragon's Teeth. It is an unregistered hybrid. Vicki added, "Catasetums are some of the easiest to grow. They start new growth in the Spring, grow profusely through the late Spring and Summer, start to go dormant in the Fall and are dormant in the Winter, when you don't have water them until the new growth is at least 6" in the Spring. I purchase my plants from various places: Ebay, different vendors, individuals and especially Sunset Valley Orchids of which Frank Clarke, owner/hybridizer of catasetinae and speaker at this recent November meeting. Vicki, congratulations again!!


