Topic: Phalaenopsis, An Introduction to the Novelty Types

Phillip was born and raised in Jamaica where he inherited his dad's passion for orchids and grew up working in his parents' orchid nursery, Hamlyn Orchids. Although his dad's true orchid passion is with the Jamaican native Broughtonia's and their hybrids, Phillip's passion leaned heavily toward Phalaenopsis, which he has been growing and hybridizing since the age of eight. He earned his undergraduate and graduate degrees in Environmental Horticulture at the University of Florida in Gainesville, and is an American Orchid Society (AOS) Accredited Judge.

Professionally, Phillip has worked for two major orchid production nurseries in Central Florida as a grower and grower/manager. In 2013, he formed his own business (part-time), Bredren Orchids, to facilitate the small-scale sale of some of the more unique Phalaenopsis and Broughtonia species and hybrids he grows and breeds. He now manages Bredren Orchids full-time since 2017, with the generous help of his wife, Liz. They are currently working on developing this business into more than just the mail-order only entity it now is. Phillip will be bringing a variety of plants for sale.

Carlos A. Cahiz is the oldest son of Carlos and Teresa Cahiz. Born in Valencia, Venezuela in 1964, he graduated from the University of Kansas in 1989. Carlos joined the family business, OFE International Orchids & Supplies in 1990, and has been with the company ever since. One of his first tests as manager was to deal with the devastation left behind from hurricane Andrew.

OFE is now located in the Redland area of Homestead. We have expanded our product line. We now not only sell orchid supplies, but also orchids and a selection of tropical plants.

Most weeks, there is something new happening at OFE. Since last October 2020, we have been hosting monthly 'OFE's Sale Fairs,' featuring from 10 to 16 different orchid, tropical and other gardening vendors in our property. These informal gatherings are free of charge to visitors. We have everybody set up outdoors and their sales booths are well separated from each other. The response from our community at our events has been great.

Behind the Scenes of the VAOS



The Venice Area Orchid Society has always been blessed by a group of wonderful volunteers willing to help with all the little things that make us successful. Each month, I will focus on a different member and give some background about them.

This month the focus is on Suzanne Grimmer. Suzanne bought a couple of orchids in 2013, stopped for lunch and left them in the car, and was horrified to find all the flowers had fallen off the plants by the time she got back! She bought a couple more orchids at our annual show, decided she was hooked on them, and joined our orchid society so that she could learn how to grow them correctly. The perfect reason to join!

In 2015, she started working with Cynthia Vance on fundraising and sponsorship for our annual show. In fact, for 4 years, Sue Grimmer actually created the

Growing Guide that was given out to everyone who attended our show. The Growing Guide was a way to both showcase our sponsors and to provide orchid cultural information to our members. It was jam packed full of growing tips including info on each type of orchid, and suggested tasks to focus on each month of the year. Suzanne said she pulled information from many different sources and blended it all together, she tried to make it a little different each year. Not only did she create the content, she often had to create the ads themselves for the sponsors. She states it took her 5 months every year to put it all together. She has discontinued doing this because of the epic amount of time it took, but she enjoys interacting yearly with our sponsors and is always looking for creative ways to showcase them. She wants the sponsors to feel they get good value for their money. She does continue to create the slideshow that runs up on the stage during the show. If anyone has any other ideas for sponsorship or wants to get involved with continuing to publish a yearly booklet, she would welcome the input.

Since Suzanne started working with our sponsors, our reserve funds have increased considerably. This is one of the reasons we were able to survive the Covid year and still provide good programing despite missing out on an entire year of income!

In 2019, Sue also began serving as Membership Chair on the Board of Directors, she tracks all the members and collects the dues. She will continue with this role until her term is up in 2023. For several years she also did most of the tech setup for the A-V system at our meetings.

Sue currently has about 50 orchid plants, all different kinds. She went as high as 75 plants but her husband Tony hates them, because they are too messy! She keeps some of them hanging in a magnolia tree, and some are in the lanai by the pool. She uses insect screening in her lanai which cuts more light than regular screen and lets in about the right amount for Cattleyas and Vandas. She keeps her Phalaenopsis on the lanai under the overhang. Suzanne is originally from New Jersey. She worked in the business office for Verizon for 36 years. She had managerial positions many different departments and was recognized as the #1 assistant manager in the state! She often worked from early morning to late night 6 days a week. There were times she was in the position of having to discipline or terminate an employee, and she found she could do it in a compassionate way that let the person know they were cared for. As a strong Christian she often prayed with her employees to help them find solutions to the problems they were facing. Despite being in the difficult position of dealing with grievances, she came away from that job feeling she did it the best way it could be done and became a kinder person because of it. She loves interacting with people, and takes satisfaction in a job well done!

Obviously Suzanne's energy, enthusiasm and work ethic have been of great benefit to our orchid society. She says the loves doing the different jobs she has done for us, she really enjoys her relationships with our sponsors and she loves interacting with our members!

July/August Culture Tip

Well, that "other" season is upon us! Those frequent afternoon thunderstorms, along with the high humidity, provides a breeding ground for fungus, insects and mites. Mites, incidentally are not in the insect "family", but rather are arachnids, in the same family as spiders and scorpions, and, hence, are not controlled by traditional "insecticides".

If, when doing your daily "orchid walk" (you DO take a daily walk around your orchids, looking for not only problems, but new growths, buds, and blossoms, right??), and you see tiny spider webs, chances are you have mites. Mites are reddish-brown or pale in color, and grow in colonies on the underside of leaves where they pierce the leaf tissue and feed by sucking out the fluids. They can go from Egg to Adult in as little as 5 days!

There are many ways to control them, organically and naturally. The method you choose will depend on your personal preference and also the number of plants you have and where you grow them. For just a few plants, grown indoors, simply wiping the leaves with an alcohol-soaked cotton ball will suffice. For orchidists with many plants, grown outside, you can use a Neem Oil spray (but NOT if the temps are over 90°!) or a product like BioAdvanced Insect, Disease & Miticide Control. It comes in a Ready-to-Use form as well as a Concentrate for use in your hose-end sprayer. As always, read and follow label directions. It will control aphids, scale, Black Spot and Powdery Mildew as well as those pesky mites!

Growers Clinic: Mounting Your Orchids

Presenters: Rick Belisle, Stephanie Luberger, Vicki Fisher & Naoki Kawamura

What an informative and spirited evening! We were so fascinated with the many various mounts and best practices for each! The collaborative back and forth between our presenters and members energized us all. As a result, we left with new eyes to review our own orchids and decide which would make a beautiful mounted display.

Benefits of Mounts

- -- Utilizes unused space in your growing area; they can hang on rods/bars/side screens.
- -- Creates a beautiful hanging display and/or art form for you to enjoy.
- -- Can save money on expensive pots; can utilize broken pot shards.
- -- May decrease fungal and bacterial diseases as roots are more exposed to moving air.

Tools, Materials and Tips

Shears -- to cut ties/ribbons and roots; don't forget to sterilize between plants

Propane Torch -- to sterilize shears and/or other equipment

<u>Vinyl Gloves</u> – toss sterile gloves after working on each plant and don new pair.

<u>Xacto Knife</u> -- to cut dead roots. Before moving to the next plant, snap off the used (razor) edge and push up the new one; saves sterilizing.

<u>Electric Drill</u> -- to make holes in mount: soak clay shard area and drill slowly to avoid cracking; better yet purchase a drill bit for 'tile'; it won't crack your clay pot. While drilling, dip drill bit in water during task to keep drill a bit cool.

<u>Soft Green Twist Ties</u> with rubberized coating -- it's gentle on tying plant roots to mount; purchase at Lowes, HD, (tomato plants area) and sometimes Dollar Tree.

<u>Zip Ties</u> -- to wrap plant around mount; after roots grab hold, you can remove them; black ones last longer in Florida heat.

<u>Fish Line</u> -- to use on top of some moss you might place over roots on some plants; don't place directly on roots/growing bulbs for as plant grows the line will cut plant.

Roll of Plant Tie Tape Ribbon, green stretchable ½ inch -- to attach plant to mount and blends into greenery; also, it won't cut into plant.

<u>Wire Hangers</u> -- to hold mount: S shaped wire hangers, many sizes; hangers with 4 separate wires to attach to holes in mount.

Needle Nose Pliers -- to twist wire of hangers so mount doesn't fall.

<u>Various Types of Mounts</u> -- Tree fern, clay pot shards; ceramic plates, 'flat' baskets, cholla cactus ribs, un-salty drift wood from fresh water streams. If found on beach, soak and rinse interminable times, or salt will kill plant; better yet keep outside for a few years so the rain eliminates all salt.

<u>Clean Table Area</u> -- switch out newspaper after each plant; use new paper for next.

<u>Hydrogen Peroxide</u> -- spray on cut areas followed by cinnamon to sprinkle on cuts.

Natural Products or Chemicals -- to treat plant disease and insects.

Remember -- place old roots on an edge so new roots have lots of space to grow.

The Redland International Orchid Festival will be held in Homestead, FL on October 7th this year instead of the spring. If you have not been, this is a remarkable display of vendors from around the world. All is taken place in the Fruit and Spice Park. You will see a variety of supplies from planters, hangings, baskets, pots as well as jewelry and clothing. Least of all the multi selection of orchids to purchase. There are also lectures available indoors. We will provide a layout of the area and a list of vendors.

June Meeting Plant Table Awards

First Place Blue Ribbon was awarded to Bill Casey for his NOID Phalaenopsis which he called "My Runaway Orchid"! Noting the unique yellow and orange coloring and shape in the center of each flower, I'm guite certain it to be Phal. Art Hall 'Hackneau', part of the Hackneau Collection found on this page: The Hackneaus gallery of Phalaenopsis orchid photos (roseg4art.com) Bill's plant is the largest Phal. most of us have ever seen in our life unless we've attended the World Orchid Conference (WOC) held every 3 years -- the next one is 2024 in Taiwan! The plant was huge with gorgeous white flowers on beautiful draping 4-6 inflorescences – more than 3 feet long! Many of us were stumped that its leaves were a dark green, when we 'know' they must be lighter in color to bloom. Obviously, we were wrong and Bill explained that most of the plant receives high filtered light most of the day. Bravo to Bill for his fantastic specimen and his first Blue Ribbon!



Second Place Red Ribbon was won by Kristin Shaw for her lovely Schoenorchis fragrans, translated as 'pretty fragrant orchid'. It is a miniature orchid that is adored for its tiny size and mini adorable flowers. As an epiphyte species, it is the cutie of the orchid family, for it can fit in your palm. Kristin grows at as a mount on a small piece of plastic with holes. She keeps it indoors on a south facing windowsill with some supplemental LED lighting -- all making for an attractive ornamental houseplant. In the wild, its 25 species can be found in NE India, Thailand, Myanmar, China and Vietnam; locally it can be found easily on the internet -- ETSY! (Be sure to check out a reputable star seller). Unfortunately, the name 'Schoenorchis' doesn't seem to have an abbreviation so we'll need to practice our spelling! Thank you, Kristin for your cultivation and for introducing us to this rare beauty!



Both Third Place Yellow and Speaker's Choice White Ribbon were awarded to Janet Keown for her stately purple and white Encyclia (E.) quadaloupe x E. Guadatam; the latter, a hybrid of E. guadalupe x E. tampensis. Remember, E. tampensis is our native Floridian orchid, which blooms in April high up in the oak trees of our nearby tropical forests. It's delightful to see these new 'tampensis' hybrids! Janet's plant was grown beautifully - a perfectly round plant! Each of the 10 inflorescences stood straight up, having received sun from all directions, a great advantage. Locally, Palmer Orchids suggests for cultivation: Grow bright and dry in an environment with good air circulation. Roots shouldn't remain wet for extended periods, particularly during the winter. (Some of us have learned this the hard way). Plants should be watered frequently during active growth, but must dry out between waterings. So again, double ribbon congratulations to Janet for her stunning multiflorous Encyclia!!




