Speaker: Tomas Bajza Topic: Miniature Orchids

To introduce myself — my name is Tomas Bajza and I am an orchid lover and addict. I

originally came to the USA from the Czech Republic and settled down in hot tropical Miami.

I adored orchids during my teenage years, but at that time there were not many to see in my country. My orchid beginnings were funny and sad, all at the same time. I managed to obtain few orchid plants back in Czech, two Phalaenopsis plants, and one Cymbidium plant. I had neither knowledge nor options to do some research (the Internet was really not present), so I grew as I felt. That approach was of course totally wrong. My poor Phals were over-watered constantly and kept by the window right above the heating, so the humidity was at zero. They must have hated me all these years as they were suffering and barely surviving, but I got at least one spike once, before they both went to orchid heaven.

My Cymbidium was even "better". That sucker did nothing except grow leaves for years. Then I went to college and moved out of the house, completely forgetting about the plant. when fertilizing my oleanders, that's it!"

I was laughing my a\*\* off about my over-caring this plant for so many years with no success while my mother just threw it outside behind the bushes. That's it, she gets the blooms!

Even though I am living in Florida surrounded by orchids, I got into serious orchid growing only over a decade ago, starting with the usual grocery store Phalaenopsis and Dendrobiums, slowly adding Cattleyas and Vandas since these were the orchids that everyone in Florida grew! All of these were large orchids and mostly hybrids. I was constantly searching different online orchid forums and saw a post about Lepanthopsis astrophora — that was the very first time I had ever seen a miniature orchid. I had no clue that such a thing even existed! I fell totally in love and immediately ordered a few. When they came, they were even smaller than I ever imagined!

That was it, I've got bitten by a "huge" miniature orchid bug — and in the past years I was fortunate enough to collect hundreds of micro and miniature orchid species, many of them pretty rare. I am a very stubborn grower — I do not listen to anything, and I do not like the word "impossible". I like all orchids, but I do love a huge amount of cold or intermediate growing species. Many growers in Florida told me that I cannot grow these here, because it is too hot, or they are too hard to grow. I do not believe any of this till I try things myself and either succeed or fail!

Through extended research, reading and being active on different orchid boards and in orchid groups, I've learned tremendously. I do not consider myself in any way an orchid expert, but someone once told me that a beginner orchid grower is someone who killed less than 10 plants, an advance orchid grower is someone who killed more than 100, and an orchid professional is someone who killed over 1000 and doesn't count anymore. By this yardstick, I do belong to advance growers.

I've been very fortunate with meeting and becoming friends with many international orchid growers and nursery owners. At the beginning, I bought only plants sold by US nurseries. Nowadays, nearly all of my orchids come from abroad. Buying orchids from US growers is safe and the majority of the plants come nicely established. Unfortunately, there are no species I am looking for offered by the US vendors anymore. I was really pushed to search and start my own importing because I could not just find any of the plants I wanted to own.

There is another "hobby" I do have, love for photography. With a growing miniature orchid collection, there were endless opportunities for taking the pictures of these amazing, sometimes microscopical blooms. Posting my pictures online caused quite a "buzz" leading to first invitations from various orchid societies to provide speeches for their members about growing miniature orchids and cold growing species in hot environment.

Here we are today. What used to be a "hobby" slowly grew to a small business that is expanding. We found out there are hundreds of growers, like me, searching for these hard to find, unusual, uncommon and rare micro and miniature orchids. Thankfully we can share our babies with the rest of the orchid world via our website and educate people interested in growing miniature and small orchids through my speech engagements across the USA. A number of my articles about miniature orchids were published in orchid magazines across the globe as well.

Doing what you love is the most rewarding thing in life!

### Orchid Media: LECA (Light Expanded Clay Aggregate)

Googling "Orchid Care" results in, literally, 137,000,000 hits! Of the many questions asked on the various on-line orchid forums available, "What media should I use?" frequently comes up. Of course, the answer is far from simple. Some follow-up questions that come to mind are: What type(s) of orchid? Where do you grow it/them? What kind of "waterer" are you?

This last one, "What kind of "waterer" are you?", is quite important. As many of you know, orchids don't like "wet feet". Most like to dry out between waterings which mimics their life in the wild. Short, heavy rains, like we have here in Florida during our wet season, allow their velamen, that thick spongy material surrounding the hair-like root, to absorb the water they need yet does not drown the plant.

The media used to grow orchids really is intended to make it easier for us, and not necessarily for the plant. Different growers use a variety of items as media. Bark, moss, wine corks, lava rock, orchiata and LECA (Light Expanded Clay Aggregate) are just a few. Each has its place in growing orchids. Let's dive a little deeper into LECA, a widely misunderstood product that can be quite valuable to us here in Florida.

Orchids that are grown in pots, outside, are prime candidates for LECA. Why? LECA is a man-made material. That is, it's an inorganic compound that does not rot nor retain excessive amounts of water, even in the presence of repeated heavy watering from growers or Mother Nature. Unlike bark or other organic (formerly- living) media that break down and begin to hold and retain more and more water as it ages, which then can prevent orchids from drying out as they should, LECA rapidly sheds water, thus preventing "wet feet". LECA does retain a small amount of water in its microscopic holes and crannies, but not enough to cause any damage.

LECA is made by many different companies and is sold under many different trade names, Aliflor, Hydroton, Glorox and Viastone, to name a few. LECA is basically small pieces of clay that are superheated and baked until it puffs up, like popcorn. This results in a course medium that is perfect for growing plants in a wet environment. It is widely used in hydroponic systems.

When you first open a bag of LECA, you'll see it has quite a bit of dust. This stems from the manufacturing process and should, if only for aesthetic reasons, be rinsed off. To do so, merely pour some into a large colander and, using a garden hose, run water through it for a few minutes while stirring it up. Do this outside, preferably in a grassy area. Now that you've removed the dust, some people choose another purely optional step, that is, to "charge" the LECA pellets. To do so, they place the desired amount in a bucket and cover the LECA with water. Let it set a few hours, preferable overnight, if you can. This will allow the nooks and crannies to fill with water and prepare it properly for the potting process. Some people add a little fertilizer, liquid seaweed or fish oil to the water, as well.

When you're ready, and if the LECA has been "charged", pot your plant(s) as usual. I add a tablespoon of Dynamite (the Red Can) to mine. Feel free to place them outside. Rain water will pass right though it and feed the plant as it does so. This is the perfect media for those of you who love to water or are known as "heavy waterers" as there is no chance to over-saturate the media, little if any chance for rot nor mold nor mildew. You will find that, normally, your watering frequency will be, once or twice per week from May through October, just before you fertilize, and weekly from November through April.

I purchase my LECA on line, from my local Home Depot where I have it shipped to the store, with free shipping, and can pick it up at my leisure. Just go to homedepot.com, and, in the Search field, type, Expanded Clay Pellets, or from Amazon.

# **Monthly Quick Tip from Your Growers Clinic Team**



#### MAY

- Be aware of air circulation longer, hotter days.
- Finish repotting of various genera.
- Water well, as needed, when dry. Be aware of rainy season if growing outdoors.
- Initiate preventive spray fungicide if heavy rains.

And, of course, cleaning up your growing area and plants by removing dead leaves helps to keep your plants healthy. This should be done throughout the year as needed.
